

# Scott and Cynthia Davidson

**Scott** graduated from Northridge High School in 1983 and began working as an automotive technician at Davidson's Garage. He and Cynthia have owned the garage since 2000. Along the way he continued his schooling and became a Master Automotive Technician and an Advanced Level Technician. He has also received arbitration training from the National Center for Dispute Settlement, and is an automotive arbitrator. In 2003, Davidson's Garage was a finalist in the Better Business Bureau's Integrity Eclipse Award. In 2004, they won the award.
