liness and bullying in schools. These awesome seats, sometimes called a "friendship bench", are provided on school playgrounds as a way for students to signal to others that they are feeling lonely and isolated and need a friend to play with or someone to talk to.

OSSC buddy benches will be rolled out to:

- combat loneliness and social isolation.
- foster opportunities for friendship and connections.
- prevent bullying.
- create a climate of inclusion and solidarity.
- create connections to improve mental health.
- help others and be a positive influence.
- provide inspiration and acceptance.
- be a source for strength and help.
- be supportive.

Weather Delays/Closings

Inclement weather during the winter months can result in school cancellations because of unsafe travel conditions. The primary considerations in the decision to delay, dismiss, or cancel school:

- safety of students and staff. •
- street conditions.
- current weather and forecasts.
- status of bus fleet.
- condition of buildings and grounds.

consultation with police, town-• ship road department, and other schools.

The delay/closing options for the Northridge Schools are:

• two-hour delay - ALL schedules are adjusted two hours. Champions Preschool A.M. Session will be closed. (Breakfast will NOT be served.)

• *closed* - ALL buildings are closed.

The decision to close and/or delay school is usually broadcast by area TV, radio stations, and the district one-call system by 6:30 a.m. In order to receive the district one-call, please contact your child's school to make sure they have your correct phone number on file.

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ODEW Changes **Graduation Requirements**

The State of Ohio Department of Education and Workforce (ODEW) issued new graduation requirements for high school students beginning with the Class of 2023.

Students need to take End of Course exams, called EOCs. Students are required to score a minimum 684 on the Algebra 1 and English Language II EOCs to graduate. If students do not pass tests, they are required to retake them once, and can repeat them as many times as necessary. A student who is unable to attain a competency score after two attempts may demonstrate competency by completing foundational and supporting options.

Additionally, the state introduced graduation "seals." Students can earn a variety of seals over different areas of education. Students must earn two seals out of a choice of 12 state and local seals. The requirements for state seals are designated by the state, while the specific requirements for local seals are chosen by the school. Of the two seals necessary, students must get at least one state seal. Some of the seals can be earned through the EOC tests. For example, students can earn the science seal by scoring 700 or higher on the Biology EOC, or earn the citizenship seal by scoring 700 or higher on the American History and American Government EOCs.

Northridge High School will be offering retake opportunities beginning Monday, November 27th and ending December 15th. Students who are retaking an EOC assessment have met with Guidance Counselor Trisha Engle and have received a testing schedule specifically made for them.

Please feel free to reach out to Trisha Engle or Testing Coordinator Kimberly Harnett if you have any questions or concerns regarding EOC retakes. Results for Algebra I, Bio, American History and American Government will be available January 17th and ELA II on February 12th.

We are looking forward to supporting your child as they participate in the Fall EOC retake opportunity.

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
