
Northridge Pride in Renovated Building

Northridge Local Schools (NLS) is proud of its newly renovated building. The school's transformation is a testament to the dedication of the community and a commitment to providing an enriched learning environment for generations to come.

The nearly 30,000 square foot state-of-the-art facility boasts modern classrooms, cutting-edge technology, and collaborative spaces designed to inspire creativity and innovation. The school's commitment to sustainability is evident in the incorporation of energy-efficient systems and environmentally conscious design elements. The renovated building stands as a symbol of progress and a commitment to fostering educational excellence.

Students now have classes in an engaging space that exhibits meticulous attention to detail in the renovation process. The building boasts beautiful, natural lighting and spacious classrooms complete with hands-on learning laboratories to offer varied skill-based project learning opportunities. The school district worked collaboratively with architects and construction teams to ensure that the final result aligned with the educational needs and aspirations of the community.

The renovated space is home to several exciting and innovative Career Technical Education programs. In partnership with the Miami Valley Career Technology Center, an Allied Health Program meets in a space designed for students to gain skills, credentials, and experiences that lead to employment and preparation for further training in the field. Similarly, the Advanced Manufacturing Program, offered in partnership with the IUE-CWA, also has space in the renovated building. Their classroom is a new, state-of-the-art learning lab where students interact with robots, the codes that make them operational, and realize the impact they have on manufacturing operations. Another space holds the Community STEM Program. The Community STEM Program offers civic engagement opportunities where students use human-centered engineering concepts to identify and solve community problems through science, technology, collaboration and creativity. The centerpiece of the Community STEM Program is a new 20-acre park on the Northridge Local Schools campus. Through the support of community partners such as the University of Dayton, Harrison Township and The Ohio Academy of Sciences, students will develop the park as a public space for natural resources, sustainability and recreation education and be 100% responsible for its maintenance. The park features a state-of-the art skate park and pump track, walking trails, and a 10+ acre greenspace for science education, keeping it true to the Community STEM mission of "creating spaces driven by young people for the benefit of all people." Overall, these CTE programs will give students the opportunity to earn industry-recognized certifications and credentials, learn through authentic and hands-on experiences, and earn credit for work experience in the field.

This renovation allowed for an expansion and enhancement of our Online Learning Alternative Program as well. This program continues to develop its academic offerings and partnerships with local businesses to provide work-study programs in addition to academic credits, while also allowing students to earn industry credentials that ensure a successful transition to post-high school life. It also hosts beautiful and friendly classrooms for our littlest Polar Bears in our preschool program.

The Northridge Local Schools' renovation is more than just a physical transformation; it symbolizes a commitment to investing in the future and creating an environment where every student can thrive. The remodeled building stands as a testament to the power of collaboration, determination, and a shared vision for **One Family United**. **Engage**. **Innovate**. *Inspire*.

The delay/closing options for the Northridge Schools are:


