Partnership with Primary Health Solutions



Northridge Local Schools and Primary Health Solutions are excited to announce a new school-linked health care partnership beginning Fall 2020. Students and families in the Northridge community will now have direct access to primary medical, dental, vision, and behavioral health care through the school district.

Primary Health Solutions, a Federally Qualified Health Center with a long history of successfully managing school-based health centers throughout Southwest Ohio, will be providing on-site care via a new Telehealth suite located in the main school of-fice and "linked" care through their facility at 300 Forest Avenue. Any student, family member or staff member can access services, which include on-site case management to assist families with health insurance and related services. (Continued on page 2.)

Meals in a COVID world are changing... again. On October 16th the USDA made it possible for us to return to and stay on the Summer Food Service Program (SFSP) rather than the National School Lunch Program (NSLP) we started the school year with. The important difference is we can now provide meals to all children age 1-18 years old. So, how will it affect your kids? I am glad you asked.



• Students learning on campus will receive meals at school.

• PS-3rd grade will be provided a plate lunch at school, Monday through Friday, and breakfast will be sent home for the next day.

• Grades 4-12 can pick up breakfast and lunch as they leave school each day. On Thursdays, double the meals will go home with them to cover Friday.

• Students learning 100% virtually will continue to have the opportunity to pick-up a week's worth of meals on Thursdays. Pre-registration is required. You can still register.



• **NEW**: Children NOT enrolled in Northridge age 1-18 may also register to pick up a weekly box of meals!

According to Northridge Local School Superintendent **Dave Jackson**, school-linked health care was the next logical step in the evolution of the community. We see our school and our community as one - a Northridge fam-

ily. One of our key core values is to 'Understand and Meet Legitimate Needs.' This is a critical need for our Northridge family, so we're going to do everything we can to meet that need."

Top 10 Return to School Expectations

- 1. If you are sick, **STAY HOME**! Report your illness to school and your doctor.
- Wear a mask to school EVERY DAY. Refusal to bring your own mask, or to wear it properly, will lead to your reassignment to remote learning.
- Bring a water bottle EVERY DAY. Water fountains are turned off, but hands free bottle fillers are available.
- 4. Maintain 6 feet of social distancing AT ALL TIMES!
- 5. Wash or sanitize your hands REGULARLY. Hand sanitizer is provided in all classrooms and in public areas.
- Bring your laptop and charger to school EVERY DAY. Make sure it is FULLY CHARGED and in a backpack.
- 7. If you are healthy, *attend school* EVERY DAY (option 1), or attend your *virtual meet-ings* EVERY DAY (option 2).
- Eat a healthy breakfast EV-ERY MORNING BEFORE SCHOOL. Breakfast will not be eaten at school.
- 9. If you ride a bus (PreK-5), KNOW YOUR STOP, WEAR YOUR MASK AT ALL TIMES, AND MAKE SURE <u>AN ADULT IS WITH YOU</u> <u>AT THE BUS STOP</u>. If you have a temperature above 100 degrees, you will NOT BE ABLE TO BOARD THE BUS.
- 10. Know which door you are supposed to enter and the time that you are allowed to enter. Refer to the ARRIVAL/DISMISSAL document on our website.

Student Success is one of Northridge Local School District's Core Values that is at the forefront of all that is done in Northridge Local Schools. The instructional staff and administration plan, collaborate,

research, and implement instructional strategies and procedures to meet the needs of all students. They work with families and students to ensure access to high quality instruction and learning is available for all students. Gifted and English learners are two student populations that require specific supports.

Students identified gifted have specific needs when it comes to academics, as well as, social and emotional skills. Teachers across the district receive on-going professional development to meet the specific needs of their gifted students. They create goals that match the student's area(s) of gifted identification and monitor those throughout the year. Students are given freedom to research and create projects that interest them, lead presentations in class, and develop passion projects.

English language learners are also another student population that has specific instructional needs. Lauren Votaw and Ana Maria Vasconez are the district English Language educators. They assess students using the Ohio English Language Proficiency Assessment each year to determine student language skills. Based on those assessments and collaborating with the classroom teachers, they create specific learning goals to help students reach mastery in listening, speaking, reading and writing in the English language, while honoring their culture and native languages.

Families of gifted students and English language learners will be receiving their educational goals in the mail. Weather Delays/Closings

Inclement weather during the winter months can result in school delays or closings because of unsafe travel conditions. The primary considerations in the decision to delay, dismiss, or close school are: • safety of students and staff; • street conditions; • current weather and forecasts; • status of bus fleet; • condition of buildings and grounds; and • consultation with police, township road department, and other schools.

<u>The delay/closing options for the Northridge Schools are:</u> • two-hour delay - Option 1 students in Grades PreK-3 report to school on a 2-hour delay. All other students will learn on an AT-HOME / REMOTE Learning Schedule FROM HOME. • closed - ALL buildings are closed. All students will learn on an AT-HOME / REMOTE Learning Schedule FROM HOME.

The decision to close and/or delay school is usually broadcast by area TV, radio stations, district website, district Facebook and the district one-call system by 6:30 a.m. In order to be sure you receive the district one-call, please contact your child's school to make sure they have your correct phone number on file.

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
