This is known as the Special Education Rating and meets federal requirements for local education agencies that receive IDEA funding. Those ratings were released on October 24th. Northridge Local Schools received the highest rating possible.

The Annual Special Education Rating developed by The Ohio Department of Education, compares districts in areas of compliance with IDEA and has recently included performance measures comparing the Graduation and Drop Out Rate for students with disabilities in the district. In both areas, compliance and performance, North-ridge earned the maximum amount of points.

The district's unwavering dedication to inclusive education and personalized learning has earned them high marks in various categories, including discipline discrepancies, disproportionality in identification into special education and specific disability categories, and initial evaluation timelines. "We are incredibly proud of the collaborative efforts of our educators, support staff, and administrators who work tirelessly to create an inclusive and nurturing learning environment for all students," said Director of Special Education **Dr. Andrea Townsend**.



At Northridge it is important for students to learn this. Students learn to ask questions, gather information effectively, and to look for important details. This elective will affect the students because they're learning to do things on their own.

It has helped students have a creative mind in coming up with their own topics in *Bear Facts*. Some things that have happened during this year are little news articles. Students have come up with the topics like volleyball, football, advice for your health, things that are going on in Northridge, and things that are happening in our community. - *two-hour delay* ALL schedules are adjusted two hours. Champions Preschool A.M. Session will be closed. (Breakfast will NOT be served.)
- *closed* **ALL** buildings are closed.
