



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

Mrs.Day was interested in becoming a teacher because she wanted to help young people see the beauty and potential in the world and show them they can make an impact in it.



In Ohio right now 26% of kids are chronically absent from school. At Northridge there are approximately 48% of kids that are chronically absent from school. The likely reason is due to the pandemic.
