Football Asst. Coach Inducted into Ohio Veterans Hall of Fame

Mark Landers has profoundly impacted civilian life through his dedication to veterans and his community. After retiring as a Colonel in 2005, Mark channeled his legal expertise into advocating for veterans' rights and benefits. Mr. Landers will be inducted into the Ohio Veterans Hall of Fame on Thursday, November 7th, at 10:00 a.m. at The Ohio State University Fawcett Center, located at 2400 Olentangy River Road, Columbus, Ohio 43210.

With an extensive background as a U.S. Government litigator, Mark successfully handled over 300 cases, involving litigation exceeding one billion dollars. His civilian career is marked by significant contributions, serving as a

county veterans service commissioner for ten years, and afterwards as Executive Director of the Montgomery County Veterans Service Commission from 2018 to 2019. During this time, he increased the number of veterans served by over 300% and played a pivotal role in the Dayton tornado recovery efforts, ensuring timely financial support for affected veterans.

Mark's commitment to veterans is further demonstrated by his instrumental role in developing *VetsLink*, a 24/7 online service for veterans, and his active participation in the Greater Miami Valley MyVeteran Community. He continues to advocate for veterans through private legal practice where he is a VA accredited attor-

ney and expert advocate in securing VA benefits.

In addition to his professional achievements, Mark is a founding member of *Just a Pair of Shoes*, a nonprofit providing shoes to children in need, and has raised substantial funds for local charities through 100 Plus MEN. He has mentored young athletes for over 40 years as a coach and high school and college football official. Mark is committed to serving all veterans by ensuring they secure all benefits they have earned. He enters the Ohio Veterans Hall of Fame at age 72.

Title 1 Parents Right to Know: Professional Qualifications

Parents may request information regarding the professional qualifications of the student's classroom teachers, including:

- (1) If the teacher has met state qualification and licensing criteria for the grade level and subject areas taught;
- (2) If the teacher is teaching under emergency or temporary status in which State qualifications or licensing criteria are waived;
- (3) The teacher's baccalaureate degree major, graduate certification, and field of discipline;
- (4) and whether your student is provided services by paraprofessionals, and if so, their qualifications.



Student Records

In accordance with law and with policies enacted by the Northridge Board of Education, the following is provided to make you aware of: the content of your child's school records, gaining access to those records, and the procedure for amending the record if necessary.

Directory information includes name, address, telephone number, date and place of birth, major field of study, participation in officially organized activities and sports, weight and height of members of athletic teams, dates of attendance, the most recent school attended, certificates and awards received. and other similar information. Non-directory information includes grades, proficiency test scores, family background information, disciplinary actions and reports of serious or recurring behavior patterns, reports by staff specialists, and interest inventories.

Directory information may be released without obtaining written consent unless you notify your child's building admin. Release of non-directory information will always be with your prior knowledge unless by court subpoena.



Search For Children With Disabilities

The Northridge Local School District, along with other school districts across the state of Ohio. continue participating in an effort to identify, locate and evaluate all children from birth through 21 years of age who may have disabilities. Disability, in this instance, means such conditions as cognitive disability, hearing impairment, speech or language impairment, visual impairment, emotional disturbance. orthopedic impairment, autism, traumatic brain injury, other health impairment, specific learning disability, deaf-blindness, and multiple disabilities. Public schools have responded vigorously to federal and state mandates requiring the provision of a free appropriate public education regardless of a child's disability. Many children with disabilities are not visible because they do not function in the mainstream of the community. Also, some identified children with disabilities are preschoolers.

The Northridge Local School District is interested in meeting the needs of children with disabilities. If you have or know of a child who may have a disability or have any questions concerning this notice, please contact Superintendent Dave **Jackson** at 937-278-5885.


Parks & Rec Students in Action
